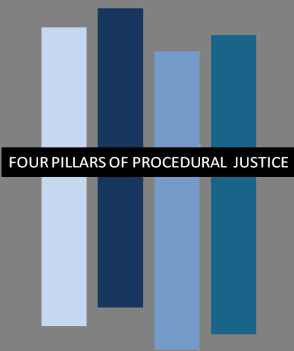




Procedural Justice for Law Enforcement Agencies: Executive Seminar

The Executive Seminar on operationalizing procedural justice is a three-hour strategy seminar for law enforcement executives and command staff.

The seminar was developed by the Center for Public Safety and Justice at the University of Illinois Chicago in partnership with key researchers and law enforcement executives. This seminar is only available in conjunction with the US DOJ COPS Office Procedural Justice Four-part Training Series.



Procedural justice is an organizational and interpersonal strategy with which law enforcement executives can build effective and respected organizations, first internally, and then externally. Too often, departmental efforts to implement this cultural shift in practice fail because they are not embraced internally or their applications are not consistently modeled by leadership.

This seminar was created to offset this common pitfall by working specifically with agency leadership to deliver an overview of the principles of procedural justice and agency-specific strategies for operationalization through interactive discussions and activities. Instructors create a learning atmosphere where executives and command staff begin the development of an agency-wide strategic plan for creating a procedurally just work environment that is supported at all levels of the agency.

The Executive Seminar is instructed by a highly qualified two-person team, bringing the perspectives of executive law enforcement and an allied profession.
